Carter was elected Master Signature Member of American Women Artists. She received the Snehil Lifetime Achievement Award, Snehilsrijan, India.










President's Message

Making art teaches us many things: patience, determination, intuition - to name a few. These skills rarely just fall into place. They usually take time and emanate from some diligent work. We wish art was easy, but it rarely is. We might enjoy the challenge, but frequently there is lots of hard work and frustration along the way. And that's precisely why it's so genuinely exhilarating when we produce something that pleases us.

Easy Is Not Always Better

By David Limrite

Nobody ever said being an artist and making art was going to be easy. And no matter how long you have been an artist, you know how difficult making art can be sometimes. This is not such a bad thing.

Of course, there are times when we are in the flow and creating just seems easy. But these times are rare. At least for me they are. Most of the time creating is just downright challenging.

Which, again, is not such a bad thing. In my 45 years of art making experience, easy is not always better.

I almost always learn way more from paintings that were challenging and difficult to make. When a painting fights me back, I try even harder to solve the issues in order to create what I want to create. I try even harder to make it work, and, as a result of my increased efforts, the work is usually better, more interesting, more exciting, and sometimes more surprising.

For me, a painting that comes too easily, is often boring, uninspired and flat. When you are faced with a painting that is being difficult and challenging, and is fighting you back, slow down, relax, be kind to yourself and focus on the process rather than the outcome.

And don't be afraid to challenge yourself when a painting challenges you.



2024 Grant Recipient: Tools For Tomorrow <u>www.toolsfortomorrow.org</u>

Thank you again for the 2024 Coachella Valley Watercolor Society Grant.

Watercolor painting is a cornerstone of the visual arts offered in Tools For Tomorrow's Creative Club program. Students love painting and ask to paint every week. Tools For Tomorrow (TFT) used the provided funds to purchase high-quality, heavy weight watercolor paper, watercolor pan paints, watercolor pencils, and high-quality paint brushes. Each teaching artist was given a pad of 140 lb. watercolor paper to use for a special project during the Creative Club session. Students and teachers enjoyed having this quality paper as it made a difference in their final artwork. We expanded the use of our watercolor pencils this year as well, and students love working with this unique way to paint.

Our teaching artists read the book <u>Ish</u> by Peter H. Reynolds to students. This is the story of a boy who loves drawing but is frustrated because he can't get it to look just right. He discovers the power of "ish" and starts to make art based on how he feels rather than trying to achieve a perfect look. We pair this with a lesson about Pablo Picasso and students draw a face-ish portrait. They use watercolor pencils to color their face and activate the pencils with water and their paintbrushes. This project is very empowering as it helps them understand that art doesn't have to look a certain way, and they are impressed by how the colored pencils turn into watercolor paint. It is a wonderful lesson and art project.

I have attached a few images of the projects and students working. We appreciate your support. For the 2024-2025 school year we had 48 Creative Club programs in 25 schools and at three Boys & Girls Clubs. As a part of our program, we provide every student a free art kit to use during our class and keep at the end of the session.

Instructions for Joining the CVWS Zoom Meeting

5:30 Social Time, 6:15 Meeting Begins

We recommend you log in 10 minutes before the meeting to get yourself set up.

ALSO Watch the YouTube Videos at the end of this page.

- 1. Zoom works best: a. Desktop Computer or b. iPad or Tablet or c. IOS/Android Phone.
- 2. Get on your device, open your CVWS email and look for "Meeting ID#...write this number down. Then click on the link in the email that says "Join Zoom Meeting". This will take you to Zoom. If you want to listen via regular telephone (not smartphone), use any of the teleconferencing phone numbers at the bottom of the email invitation.
- 3. When Zoom opens, click Join a Meeting.
- 4. It will ask for the Meeting ID Number and Password, which will be in your email invitation. Enter your name. This identifies you to others in the meeting.
- 5. Click Join. Then Click Join With Video or Join Without Video, if you don't want others to see you.
- 6. Click Join with Computer Audio. If you don't have a microphone enabled on your device, you can type in your questions during the Q&A using the Chat feature at the bottom of your screen. If using an Android or IOS phone, tap the screen and the controls will appear. **YOU'RE IN!!**
- 7. When you enter the meeting, you will see the person that is talking on your full screen ("Speaker View"). If you would also like to see the other participants in the meeting in a grid layout, switch to "Gallery View". The controls for these are: a. Desktop Windows or Mac: On the top right of your screen. b. Ipad: On the top left. c. Android/IOS phone: Swipe left to switch from Active Speaker view to Gallery View. Keep swiping left to see more of the gallery.
- 8. Your microphone and video on/off are on the bottom left of a desktop. Tap the screen for smartphones and Ipads and the toolbar will come up. You will see icons for the microphone and video with a bar through them if they are not on. During the meeting presentations, your mic will be off unless you're called on to ask a question, and then the meeting manager will turn on your mic.
- 9. If you want to leave the meeting, click End, then Leave Meeting. There are a number of good videos that you can watch to help you use Zoom for the first time. Here are a couple:
